Triton College Alumnus Bulmaro "Bull" Saavedra Went from Machine Tool Technology to Margaritas



Bulmaro "Bull" Saavedra of Morton Grove is the owner of Hay Caramba!, a Mexican restaurant in Park Ridge. With a successful business under his belt, many would think Saavedra achieved the embodiment of the American Dream. However, Saavedra's road to success has not always been smooth.

Saavedra grew up in Mexico in a small town called Los Sauces, Guerrero. Growing up, he struggled in school and wanted to move to the United States, eventually immigrating to Chicago in 1973. Once in Chicago, he began working for Standard Grinding & Mfg. Co., a machinery business located in Skokie.

"Standard Grinding sent me to Triton College and enrolled me in the Machine Tool Technology Program to learn how to run machinery," he explained. "At the time, I hardly spoke any English, so going to Triton taught me a lot. It was an amazing school experience."

Saavedra married his wife Josephine in 1975, and soon after, began thinking about starting his own business, his lifelong dream. Making this dream a reality, he opened his first restaurant in Chicago, in 1986. By 1989, Saavedra found himself no longer working full time in the machine shop, but spent all his time at the restaurant.

In 1991, Saavedra and his wife decided to open a restaurant in Park Ridge called Hay Caramba! Recently celebrating the 30-year anniversary of their opening, Saavedra noted that Hay Caramba! serves several of their old family recipes, with the fajitas being Saavedra's favorite.

"During the pandemic, we stayed open for carryout, so our business was still able to thrive," he said. "We are grateful that we enjoy a lot of support from the community."

Now, as a successful restaurant owner, Saavedra and his wife enjoy serving customers and making them happy.

"Hospitality is a wonderful way to connect with the community and share in their celebrations of life," he said

Although the job can be challenging, since they must sacrifice nights and weekends, Saavedra feels it is worth the hard work they have put into their restaurant. He's grateful that Triton College gave him the foundation and tools to run and open a successful business.

When Saavedra is not working, he enjoys relaxing with his family and traveling. Saavedra and his wife Josephine have two adult children, Michael and Marlene, who work at the restaurant with their parents.

Triton College's New SEED Program Helps Students with Independent Community Employment

Triton College's Center for Access and Accommodative Services (CAAS) has a new program to help students who utilize academic accomodations – the Skill Enhancement and Employee Development (SEED) Program.

SEED allows greater face-to-face instruction, according to Deborah Kaczmarek, director of CAAS. Kaczmarek said SEED is an updated plan for students, giving them the skills necessary for future employment in the community.

Like the previous program,
SEED provides the same type
of employment skills, such
as professionalism, financial
management, social communication,
coping skills, job expectations and
resume writing. However, students
now have classroom instruction with
lectures and hands-on, practical
activities. Kaczmarek feels the longer
campus employment experience
better prepares the students for their
community employment experience.

SEED is comprised of two cohorts with each containing six students. The cohorts are small to maintain individual attention and assistance.

The first 10 weeks of the program will consist of the students learning in the classroom. The next 10 weeks, students will continue classroom instruction and work at on-campus jobs. From Oct. 20-Dec. 16, the students will perform community work experiences. Upon completion of all three parts of the program, students will graduate and will receive a certificate from the School of Continuing Education on Jan. 12, 2023.



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Triton College's CareerCube Allows Community to Take Free Professional Headshots



Triton College students, staff and community members can now get a professional photo of themselves with Triton's CareerCube. The CareerCube can be used for all professional photo needs including LinkedIn, social media and resumes, and is free for students and community members who live within Triton's district.


According to its website, irisbooth.com, the CareerCube is "the process of taking a selfie, but with the result of a high-end studio."

Located in the Career Services Office in the A Building (A-204), the main goal of the CareerCube is to further careers with an efficient photograph that will catch the eye of employers on a resume or on LinkedIn. Accessing the CareerCube is simple – users can enter the booth and have three photos with three different poses taken. Afterwards, users are able to do light touch up work within the booth before the photos are emailed to them. They can also edit the photos on their smartphone on their own time. The process can take between five and 10 minutes, depending on how much editing users choose to do.

It is encouraged to dress professionally within the CareerCube since the photos will be used for career-related needs.

The CareerCube can be accessed Monday through Thursday, from 8 a.m.-4:30 p.m., and Fridays from 8 a.m.-3 p.m.

Triton College's New Renewable Energy Technology Degree Program

Triton College is offering Renewable Energy Technology, a degree program that teaches students techniques and skills in the renewable energy industry. This industry includes solar, wind and energy storage, amongst other relevant topics.

Triton College in partnership with the Illinois International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, IBEW 134 REF (134 Renewable Energy Fund) is able to offer both Renewable Energy Technology Certificate and Degree programs on campus. All instructors for this program are from IBEW and impart the most current knowledge to the Triton students.

IBEW REF offers significant scholarship support opportunities for students enrolled in the Renewable Energy Program at Triton.

According to Frances Figg, chairperson of Triton College's Architecture and Construction Technology Program, the skills provided from this program will lead towards many future employment opportunities and noted that the program has been growing with popularity.

In 2021-2022, seven students were enrolled and completed this degree program. Out of those seven, two of them graduated with an associate degree and five finished with Renewable Energy Technology certificates.

According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, renewable energy jobs are projected to grow 52 percent from now to 2030. There will be 2,300 clean energy job openings projected each year, on average.

Triton College has obtained a full solar array system, currently located outside the east wall of the T Building (Room T-160). The system has been used by students enrolled in the Renewable Energy Technology Degree Program to help them learn about clean energy.


Through a grant from IGEN (Illinois Green Economy Network) Triton was able to receive a full solar array system and attached battery storage system. This grant also allowed Triton to engage professional electricians to install the full solar array system and the battery backup systems.

A full solar array system is a collection of solar panels mounted on a rack system.

Students enrolled in the program gain hands-on experience using an interactive photovoltaic and energy storage system from the full solar array system.

"A full solar array system will reduce our reliance on fossil fuels and lessens greenhouse gas emissions, which are major contributors to climate change," said Figg.
