




#### **Triton College Welcomes PLUS Lab**

"This is very magical for me," he explained.

#### Yoshio Yamashita Celebrates 100th Birthday

Former Triton College noncredit continuing education golf instructor Yoshio Yamashita celebrated his 100th birthday earlier this year. Yamashita had his friends and family in attendance at the golf-themed party, as well as Triton College President Mary-Rita Moore.

Yamashita's daughter, Nancy Lind, said her father loved teaching golf at Triton College, explaining that he taught part-time classes in the evenings and on weekends.

"Golf has always been my dad's passion," she said. "He enjoyed sharing his love for golf. It was so gratifying for him to teach others how to play the sport."

Yamashita was born on Jan. 12, 1923, in Hawthorne, Calif. According to Lind, Yamashita had to go into an internment camp as a young man. Afterwards, he served in World War II in Germany and came to Chicago after his duty. While in Chicago, he attended Northwestern University and Loyola University Chicago and received a degree in chemistry. Yamashita taught at Triton from June 1994-November 2000 and then again from June 2004-September 2012.

Yamashita married Kay (Kudo) and had three daughters – Janice Miles, Hope Yamashita and Nancy Lind.

"My dad enjoyed helping people," noted Lind. "That's why Triton was so beneficial for him. He truly felt like he was inspiring and guiding others."

The Triton College Hospitality Industry Administration (HIA) students participated in the fundraiser "Empty Bowls" at Oak Park and River Forest High School (OPRF).

"Empty Bowls" is a bowl-of-soup fundraiser hosted at OPRF according to Bridget Doherty, an art instructor and teacher sponsor for "Empty Bowls" at OPRF. For one night, community members are invited to enjoy delicious soup in a handmade, glass bowl, with all proceeds going to organizations that fight hunger. OPRF pottery students along with local artists created the handmade bowls, while local restaurants and businesses donate the soup and bread to fill them.

This was a significant year for the fundraiser because it was the 20th anniversary and the first in-person "Empty Bowls" event in three years due to the pandemic.

Chef Manny Uribe, Hospitality Department chairperson, said six students from the HIA 277 Catering Management class participated in "Empty Bowls." The students made broccoli cheddar, roasted butternut squash and pozole soups for the occasion, learning how to create vast quantities of soup for a large amount of people.

#### **Baseball Player Kirby Puckett Inducted into the NJCAA Foundation Hall of Fame**

Triton College baseball great and Major League Baseball Hall of Famer Kirby Puckett was posthumously inducted into the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) Foundation Hall of Fame June 8 at their awards dinner in Charlotte, N.C.

His son, Kirby Puckett, Jr., accepted the award on behalf of his father and the Puckett family.

After attending Bradley University, Puckett transferred to Triton and had great success in a Trojan uniform in the spring of 1982. He led Triton to a 57-12 overall record and a trip to the Junior College World Series in Grand Junction, Colo.

In the 1982 season, Puckett hit .472 with 16 home runs and 78 RBIs, along with 28 doubles, eight triples and 42 stolen bases. He was selected as a First-Team NJCAA All-American and was named NJCAA Player of the Year.

In 1999, Puckett was inducted into the Region 4 Hall of Fame and 2001 into the Major League Baseball Hall of Fame following a successful 12-year professional career with the Minnesota Twins, including winning two World Series titles in 1987 and 1991.

Triton College President Mary-Rita Moore and Garrick Abezetian, associate vice president of Athletics, were proudly in attendance at the dinner.



#### **Monraia Wilson**

Monraia Wilson became the first NJCAA All-American representing the Triton College women's Basketball Program in 29 years. She also was named Region 4 Division I Player of the Year. Wilson finished the season ranked eighth in the nation in steals (98) and 35th in assists (122). She finished eighth all time in Triton history with 858 career points.

The Hoffman Estates native graduated from Triton in May of 2023 and received a full athletic scholarship at Tusculum University in Greenville, Tenn. Wilson also left her mark in helping women's basketball win their first regional title since 1994 as a freshman in 2021.

"I'm so happy," she said. "We hadn't had that in 29 years. My name will forever be stamped there. I want people to remember me not only from basketball, but also as a person. I'm a person of my word. Recruiting of Triton basketball skyrocketed. People want to follow and join. That's what it's all about."

#### **Kimani Coffee**

Kimani Coffee from the Triton track & field team placed third in the discus throw at the NJCAA Division III Outdoor Track & Field Championships held in May of 2023 in Utica, N.Y.

The Proviso West High School graduate posted a throw of 42.76m. His showing also earned him NJCAA All-American status.

"It means a lot," Coffee said. "It means I know where I am in track and also where I want to be. I know there's a lot more room for improvement. It's more responsibility for my brain and taking responsibility for my body."

Coffee is attending Morgan State University in Baltimore.

#### **Wrestling Team**

The Triton College wrestling team wrapped up their best season under head coach Tim Duggan, as the Trojans brought home three All-Americans at the NJCAA Wrestling Championships held March 3 and 4 in Council Bluffs, Iowa. Elon Rodriguez placed fourth at 133, Anthony Schickel was fifth at 125 and Connor Svantner was the final Triton NJCAA All-American with an eighth place showing at 157.

"Our team had real high hopes going in," Duggan said. "We started off well (winning seven first round matches). But in the round of 16, we lost some really tight matches and had some things that didn't go our way. Still to get three NJCAA All-Americans is quite a step for our program. We set our standards high. Each year we'll continue to get better and know what we'll have to do to fight for a national championship."

During the All-American ceremonies the final night of the tournament, Duggan was named National Wrestling Coaches Association Coach of the Year. "I knew that I was in the running and what's special about the award is that it's voted by the coaches. I thought that was really nice and to receive such a high honor from the other coaches meant a lot to me."



# The Cernan Earth and Space Center's 50th Anniversary of Capt. Eugene "Gene" Cernan's Apollo 17 Mission Receives Positive Feedback

The Triton College Cernan Earth and Space Center's 50th anniversary celebration of Capt. Eugene "Gene" Cernan's Apollo 17 Mission received positive feedback from the Triton district and beyond, attracting a wide variety of visitors.

The celebration began Wednesday, Nov. 23, 2022, and ran through Saturday, April 8, 2023.

The most exciting temporary exhibit was the lunar sample, also known as a moon rock, actually collected during Capt. Cernan's Apollo 17 NASA Mission in 1972. The moon rock was encased within a lucite pyramid and sat atop a lighted pedestal for public viewing.

"Many visitors remarked how the "moon rock" looked like a charcoal briquette," noted Kris McCall, director of the Cernan Earth and Space Center. "They didn't expect for it to be almost black, but that's because the sample came from one of the dark areas on the lunar surface which was filled in by ancient lava flows."

According to McCall, visitors have traveled from near and far to see Triton's new exhibits, with field trips ranging from the city of Chicago to the far western suburbs.

# Cernan Earth and Space, Center

LUNAR SAMPLE 70215.41 (007)
This Apollo 17 Lunar Sample (Moon rock) was collected by Astronaut Jack Schmitt near the Lunar Module landing side. This rock weights 120 grams. It is a fragment of the original rock which weighed 8,110 grams when returned to Earth. The sample is a mare basalt. This rock, like all mare basalts, is very old, abut 3,750,000,000 years, older than 99,99% of all Earth surface rocks. Scientific research is being conducted on the balance of this sample at NASA's Johnson Space Center and other research centers in the United States and certain foreign nations under a continuing program of investigation involving lunar samples collected during the Apollo Program.

This Apollo 10 spacesuit is on display in the Cernan Earth and Space Center.

# **Respiratory Care Program**

If you're looking for a thrilling, sought-after career in saving lives and helping those in need, Triton College's Respiratory Care Program is for you! The program is excitedly coming to Triton's campus in the fall of 2024.

Respiratory therapists have a variety of responsibilities, such as performing diagnostic testing, assessing and diagnosing patients of all ages, administering pulmonary medications, managing ventilators, drawing blood, and assisting newborns and their mothers during high-risk deliveries. They also can treat asthma and Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD), help patients with effective breathing and assist with rehabilitation from chronic respiratory conditions, among many other roles.



According to Alexandria Terrazas, dean of Early College Programs, the Dual Credit Program enables high school students to take college classes taught at their high school by high school instructors who are qualified to teach the college courses. If they pass the course successfully, students can receive college credit at their high school. As for the Dual Enrollment Program, high school students can earn college credit by taking approved courses by their high school on Triton's campus.

Triton College is in its second year of offering the Dual Degree Program. This program allows selected in-district high school juniors the opportunity to complete their high school diploma and associate degree simultaneously. Over a two-year period, students can attend classes at the college that will fulfill the requirements for their high school diploma and associate degree, allowing students to move on to complete their bachelor's degree.




## **Summary of Fiscal Year 2023**


