New Cosmetology Program Blends Art and Science

Triton College is excited to introduce its new Cosmetology Certificate Program this fall. The program is designed to equip students with both the creative artistry and scientific knowledge to thrive in the beauty industry.

With a dynamic curriculum that blends hands-on training and academic instruction, the program will complement Triton's Barber Certificate Program to offer even more pathways into high-demand careers.

"Triton's Cosmetology Certificate Program is both cost- and time-effective," said Donita Mitchell, Cosmetology faculty. "There are endless possibilities for success."

Students will dive into all aspects of cosmetology – hair coloring, cutting, weaving, wigs, skincare and more – while also learning the science behind the services. Dr. Troy Moran, dean of Triton's Health Careers and Public Service Programs,

noted that the curriculum covers everything from anatomy and the nervous system to the biology of the scalp, nails and skin.

The program requires 50 credit hours, meeting the 1,500 clock-hour requirement set by the Illinois Department of Financial and Professional Regulation. Graduates will be eligible to sit for the state licensure exam to become licensed cosmetologists.

With Triton's affordable tuition, students can gain a high-quality education at a fraction of the cost of private cosmetology schools.

Mitchell emphasized that the beauty industry is booming. "There will be an 8% growth in the field," she said, adding that Triton students will be well positioned to take advantage of that.

Triton Powers Up with New Electric Vehicle Program



Triton College is accelerating its commitment to workforce development with the launch of a new Electric Vehicle (EV) Certificate Program.

Backed by a \$9.4 million Rev Up EV Initiative Grant, Triton is one of just six Illinois community colleges developing training programs for EV infrastructure. Students will gain hands-on experience using industry-standard equipment in the college's state-of-the-art learning facility.

"This is a rapidly growing, high-demand field," said Andrea Blaylock, chair of Triton's Engineering Technology. "Our program offers a more affordable, accessible alternative to technical schools – right here in our community," she said.

The program includes 17 credit hours in electric systems, safety, ethics and more. Students can earn stackable certificates in electrical installation and maintenance, and continue toward a Mechatronics degree. Graduates will also earn an OSHA 10-HR card and be ready for entry-level careers with utility companies, municipalities and EV manufacturers.

Dual Credit options are available through local high schools, allowing students to earn college credit while still in high school.

"EV technology isn't going anywhere," said Blaylock. "This program places our students at the center of one of the biggest transformations in the auto industry in over a century." Learn more at triton.edu/ev.
