

In today's competitive job market, earning an industryrecognized certificate has become a launchpad for students advancing or changing their careers. Community colleges like Triton play an important role in providing accessible pathways to these certificates, which are valued by employers in a variety of industries.

According to a recent survey from the National Student Clearinghouse Research Center's 2024 *Undergraduate Degree Earner's Report*, more students earned a certificate last year than in any of the past 10 years. There were more certificate earners among traditional college-aged students, 18-20 years of age, than any other age group. Nearly 154,000 students in this age group earned a certificate, a 10.9% increase over the previous year. Certificates often focus on specific skills and knowledge required for in-demand jobs, allowing students to quickly gain the competencies necessary for employment.

An advantage of certificates is their alignment with labor market needs. Community colleges collaborate with local industries to make sure that their programs are relevant and tailored to the skills employers are seeking. This not only boosts students' employability, but also fosters stronger connections between community colleges and local economies.

Many of Triton College graduates began their journey with a certificate and later pursued an associate or bachelor's degree, building on their foundational skills. As students reach their goals, they gain a sense of accomplishment.

#### **Honoring the Academic Achievements of Students**

Triton College finished its academic year with several celebratory events, including the 2025 Commencement held at the Rosemont Theatre on May 17.

Through its commitment to lifelong learning, Triton College graduated nearly 2,000 students – ranging in age from 15 to 76 – who have earned certificates and degrees.

During the ceremony, Mark Kouria of Elmwood Park, president of the Triton College Student Association (TCSA), delivered a student reflection. Kouria earned an Associate in Science degree and will transfer to Governors State University to pursue a Bachelor and Master of Science in nursing. "I've made so many wonderful connections and friendships these past two years," he said. "Graduating feels like I'm leaving home and a family. I want to stay in touch with all the incredible people I've met here and for our kids to grow up together. I want to stay connected to this amazing community and Triton College."

The Triton College Board of Trustees also recognized Scholars Program students, Lavonia Black, Eliska Horakova, Alexandra Mercado, Jana Milicevic and Emily Urueta-Hernandez for their extraordinary academic achievements and successful degree completion. During its May meeting, the board applauded the students.

The Scholars Program is a competitive, twoyear program for academically talented indistrict students planning to transfer to fouryear institutions.

At Fermilab, Nathan and Carroll will gain hands-on technical experience. The internship paves the way for students to pursue exciting careers in science, technology, engineering and math.

CCI is a paid internship sponsored and managed by the U.S. Department of Energy, Office of Science's Office, through its Workforce Development for Teachers and Scientists (WDTS). The opportunity places students at DOE laboratories and facilities across the country. Students participate in a 10-week paid internship during the summer (May-August) or the academic year (August-December or January-May).

### **Barber Certificate at Triton Offers Creative Path to a Dynamic Career**

Triton College's Barber Certificate Program provides students hands-on experience and expert instruction in a rapidly growing industry, equipping them with the tools and training needed to enter a dynamic and in-demand field.

Program Chair Zachary Morris, a licensed barber with over 16 years of experience, teaches in a cutting-edge learning facility on the Triton College campus. The space is designed to simulate a real-world barbershop environment. Students gain skills in haircutting, styling, coloring techniques, skincare and business fundamentals.

The Barber Certificate requires

50 credit hours, equivalent to the 1,500 clock hours mandated by the Illinois Department of Financial and Professional Regulation. Upon completion, students are eligible to take the Illinois Licensed Barber Examination.

Graduates of the program will be prepared to enter a growing field. According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, employment for barbers, hairstylists and cosmetologists is projected to grow 8% by 2032 – faster than the average for all occupations. Visit triton.edu/barber to learn more.

Through a grant from the U.S. Department of Energy, five students in the engineering program will receive scholarships and participate in a paid summer internship at Fermilab after their first year.



#### **Triton Trojans Wrap Up a Strong Spring Season**

The Triton Trojans capped off an exciting spring season with standout performances across multiple sports.

Ava Connerty was crowned national champion in the women's 100-meter hurdles at the NJCAA Division III Outdoor Track & Field Championship held Saturday, May 10, in Utica, New York. She won by just two-tenths of a second! Connerty, a graduate of Riverside-Brookfield High School, is Triton's first women's track national champion and a back-to-back NJCAA All-American.

The men's basketball team finished 29-6, winning the Region 4 Division I championship and advancing to the second round of the NJCAA Division I Championship in Hutchinson, Kansas. Star player Dayjaun Anderson earned NJCAA Division I First-Team All-American, Region 4 First Team and Region 4 Player of the Year honors.

The women's basketball team were Region 4 Division I runnersup with a 27-5 record. Jordyn Coleman received NJCAA Division I Honorable Mention All-American and Region 4 First Team recognition. Coaches Brian Burns and Drew Winston were named NJCAA Division I Co-Coaches of the Year by the Illinois Basketball Coaches Association.

Triton's softball team finished with a strong 29-13 record, advancing to the Region 4 Division II quarterfinals. "They're a family, and I couldn't be prouder," said head Coach Ken Jurasz.

On the mat, nine Trojan wrestlers competed at the NJCAA Wrestling Championships in Iowa, with three earning All-American status: Ghee Rachal (197, sixth place), Ryan Boersma (285, sixth place), and Ashton Hayhurst (149, fifth place).
