The college held their first ever Italian American Heritage Month Panel and Discussion, featuring Triton faculty, staff and alumni. The panel was featured on ABC7 Chicago as a news highlight.

Moderator Frank Di Piero, host of the podcast *Keepin' It Real with Frankie D*, asked a series of questions that pertained to each panelist and their Italian-American heritage.

"My husband is 100 percent Italian, and he has blonde hair and blue eyes," she joked. "I love traveling to Italy and relishing in the beauty, art, food and music."

Colleen Rockafellow, associate vice president of Business Operations at Triton College, talked about her brother Joe Mazzuca's career as a professional baseball player. Joe Mazzuca played for the Florida Marlins, and then eventually began playing for the Italian national baseball team.

Each panelist was asked by Di Piero where their family hails from in Italy and if they have ever traveled back to their motherland.

"Every Italian-American should at least visit Rome once in their life," Di Piero explained. "There is so much culture and history. It's truly an incredible country."

Those in attendance were able to live *la dolce vita* with gelato, pizzelles (traditional Italian waffle cookies), Italian candy and pastries after the event.
