

## Come watch the Moon pass through Earth's shadow at Triton College's Cernan Earth and Space Center.

A total lunar eclipse is interesting when seen with your own eyes, but telescopes or binoculars enhance the view. A lunar eclipse is perfectly safe to look at because you are viewing the Moon, NOT the Sun.

8:00 PM - Dark Side of the Moon Cosmic Light Show in the planetarium. Tickets are \$5.

9:00 PM - telescope observing begins

9:10 PM - eclipse demo in the planetarium

9:29 PM - partial lunar eclipse begins

9:40 PM - eclipse demo in the planetarium

10:10 PM - eclipse demo in the planetarium

10:30 PM - total lunar eclipse begins

11:00 PM - telescope observing ends


11:12 PM - totality reaches maximum

11:56 PM - total lunar eclipse ends

12:55 AM - partial lunar eclipse ends (May 16)

**Admission** to the Total Lunar Eclipse event is free EXCEPT for the Dark Side of the Moon cosmic light show which is \$5 per person. Tickets go on sale at 7:30 PM.
